What makes the Powers' Festival unique?



Nestled on 26 acres of natural woodlands just outside Newnan on Georgia Highway 34 West, this nationally-recognized event is well known for presenting handmade works of outstanding artists and craftspeople from all over the United States along with continuous musical entertainment and

scrumptious southern food. Many artists can be found painting, sculpting, or making jewelry along the meandering paths of the beautifully wooded festival grounds.

Founded in 1971 by local artist Tom Powers, who envisioned this annual gathering of artists and craftspeople at his boyhood home—the historic Powers Plantation, today's festival is managed by Coweta Festivals, a non profit group made up of five community organizations. Proceeds from each year's event are returned to the community through a variety of projects.
